CONNECTICUT

Connecticut's Department of Environmental Protection (CT DEP) posts information on <u>electronics recycling</u> opportunities in the state. Connecticut's <u>Electronic Recycling Law</u>, expected to take effect in early 2011, is designed to ensure that residents have convenient and free opportunities to recycle their computers, printers, televisions, and monitors. Manufacturers must finance the transportation and recycling of electronics. Under the law, electronics designated for recycling are known as *covered electronic devices* or "CEDs." A disposal ban on CEDs took effect on January 1, 2011.

The CT DEP maintains a list of <u>residential e-waste drop-off locations</u> on its Website. For more information, contact <u>municipal recycling coordinators</u> for specific electronics recycling information.

DELAWARE

The Delaware Solid Waste Authority (DSWA) has an <u>Electronic Goods Recycling Program</u> that allows homeowners and businesses to conveniently drop-off their unwanted computers, televisions, and other electronic items for free at <u>DSWA facilities statewide</u>. DSWA will also accept electronic goods for recycling at all <u>Household Hazardous Waste Events</u>. An <u>Electronic Goods Recycling Brochure</u> and other information on electronics recycling are available on the <u>DSWA Website</u>.

MAINE

It is illegal in Maine to dispose of computer monitors or televisions. All unwanted computer monitors and televisions from households, businesses, and institutions must be recycled. An alphabetical listing by town of collection sites for this unwanted electronic waste is available online.

In addition, Maine's State Planning Office (SPO)'s provides a <u>Listing of Municipal Recycling Programs</u> that provides a listing of municipal recycling program staff and contact information. MASSACHUSETTS

NEW HAMPSHIRE

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NH DES) has a list of commercial demanufacturers and charitable organizations that accept computer equipment, with a particular emphasis on computer monitors and televisions.

NEW JERSEY

The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection provides a listing of places to recycle e-waste on its <u>Website</u>. As of January 1, 2011, computers, monitors, laptops, portable computers and televisions can no longer be put in the trash. The <u>Electronics Waste Management Act</u> requires that free recycling for computers, monitors, laptops, portable computers, and televisions be available for residents and small businesses. The costs are paid by electronics manufacturers.

NEW YORK

On April 1, 2011, New York State's <u>Electronic Equipment Recycling and Reuse Act</u>, a comprehensive manufacturer-financed e-waste recycling program, takes effect. This law will result in free opportunities for consumers, schools, municipalities, small businesses, and small non-profits to recycle televisions, computer monitors, computers, computer peripherals, printers, fax machines, and some small electronic devices. The state will be maintaining a list of all locations for e-waste recycling.

PENNSYLVANIA

Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has comprehensive information on its <u>Electronic Management Program</u>, including donation and recycling of unwanted electronics. Specific information about county <u>Electronics Collection</u>

Programs is also available.

Full implementation of Pennsylvania's "Covered Device Recycling Act," will take place January 2012. The legislation requires e-waste manufacturers to finance the recycling of designated electronics, including televisions, computers, monitors, keyboards, mice, and printers. The law also requires a ban on e-waste disposal in landfills to be implemented January 2013.

RHODE ISLAND

The Rhode Island Resource Recovery Corporation (RIRRC) offers Rhode Island residents <u>free recycling</u> of computers, monitors, mouse pointers, hard drives, modems, scanners, laptops, printers, and televisions at its facility in Johnston and at a scheduled satellite collection dates. A schedule of collection events is posted on the RIRRC Website.

<u>RI's Electronic Waste Law</u> established a disposal ban for "covered electronic products." Under the law, manufacturers of electronic products have individual financial responsibility to take back and recycle products from residents and schools.
