

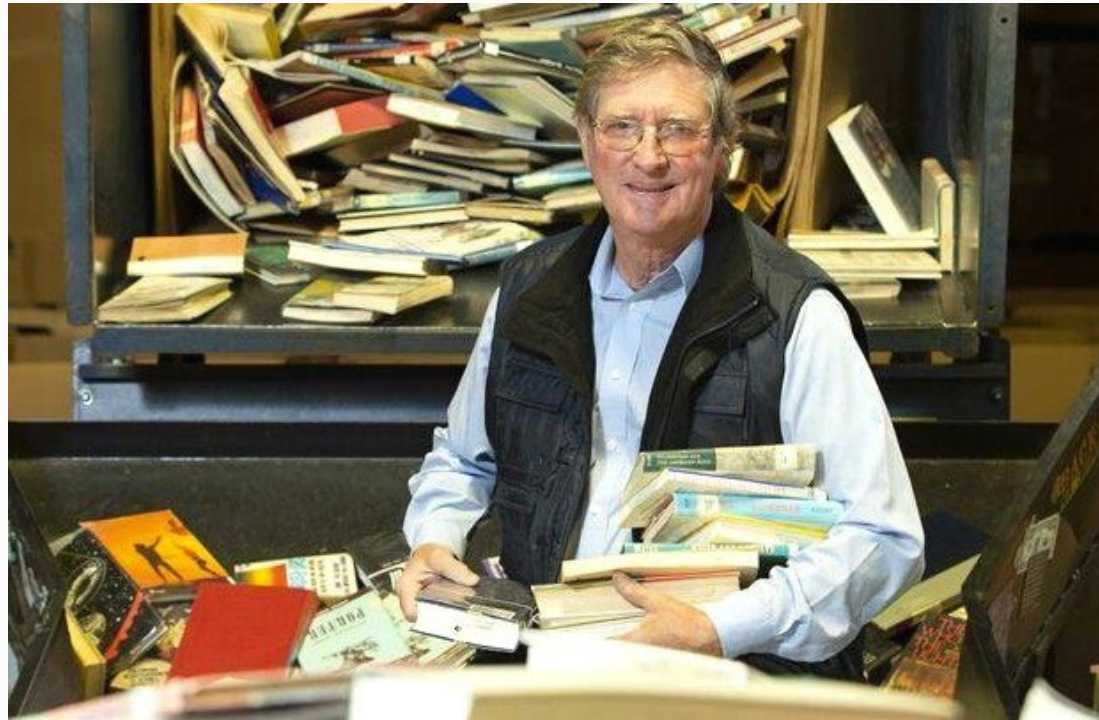

SVdP has 67 years of experience in reusable and recyclable product diversion. We strive to be good stewards of community resources and make every effort to minimize landfilling. SVdP follows the waste hierarchy of reduce, reuse, and then recycle.

With 12 stores, 1 used car lot, and 4 mattress recycling facilities, SVdP has the experience, expertise, and capacity to continue providing this vital service to our communities in both the greater Lane County area, as well as northern California.





Oregon

In Oregon, we currently employ 228 individuals, spanning across our warehouse, sorting, and thrift operations. Each of these staff members make an impactful difference every day in the effort to divert waste from the dumps and reuse and recycle - being good stewards to our environment.



California

For the California mattress recycling warehouses, we currently employ 66 individuals.



Volunteers

St. Vincent de Paul utilizes community members who have signed up to join our volunteer pool in many ways, whether it is supporting our overnight emergency shelters, or helping to sort and process donations. SVdP currently has 17 volunteers volunteering in our stores.

WHAT IS THE VALUE OF MATERIALS OR NUMBER OF ITEMS THAT WE DIVERT?

Example: Mattresses

In Lane County, approximately 965 tons, or 32,077 mattresses were collected at the Glenwood Transfer Station from community members over a twelve month period. The value of these recycled units is approx. \$341,820 (average weight of 55lbs/mattress & \$360 price per ton).

As the oldest mattress recycler in the United States, we estimate that our facilities in Oregon and California will divert more than 400,000 mattresses from landfills.

In 2021, SVdP operations in California alone diverted over 11.5million pounds of various material including:

- o 5.8 million pounds of scrap metal - approximately half came from mattresses
- o 1.6 million pounds of wood - almost all came from box springs
- o 200,000 pounds of textiles - this includes cotton waste from mattresses
- o 3.8 million pounds of plastic - almost all came from polyurethane foam and toppers
